Wrap around services within a clinical case management model

- Holistic approach within safe environment key to success
- Utilizing Maslow's hierarchy of needs
- Adapted to meet specific needs of Gila River Indian Community

Needs assessment

- Client needs much broader than sobriety
 - ◆ CPS / legal involvement
 - ◆ Financial challenges
 - ◆ Limited access to employment
 - ◆ Limited housing
 - ◆ Lack of sober supports
 - ◆ Trauma history
 - ◆ Limited transportation

Support and safety

- Persistent / consistent ---Transportation daily
- Lunch and snacks provided
- Children accompany participants
- Extensive “check-in” time/schedules
- CBT / relapse prevention
- Drug screens and prizes
- Risk assessment and family planning
- Advocacy with CPS and courts
- Education / presentations by local social service and training agencies
- Expansion to 7 days a week

Wrap around process

- Collaboration with case management
- Addition of trauma therapist
- Art therapy groups
- Weekend peer support calls
- Peer support (AA meetings)

Case Example

- Sometimes the system works against you
- Sometimes the system will take a chance on treatment
- Support from the group makes considerable difference

- Growth and commitment by the participants has been impressive
- With our population, more is better

- “Unwrapping” - Transitioning to less intensive levels of care
